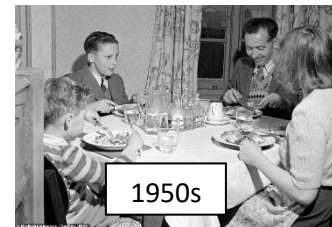

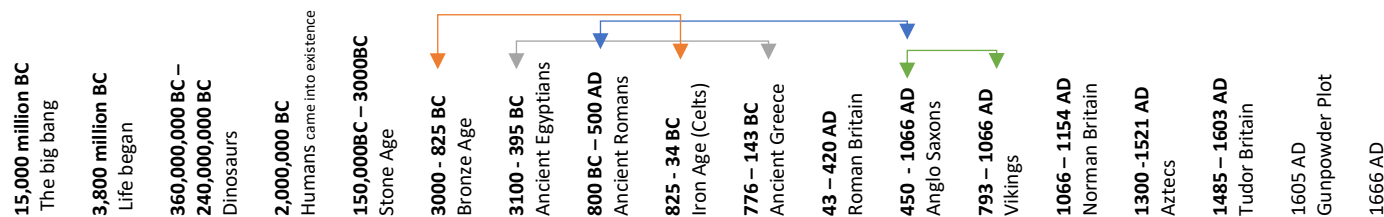

50s	Children in the 1950s had very different lives to young people today. Most left school much earlier, with many starting work at 14, and far fewer people had the chance to go on to further education. The after-effects of the Second World War were still ongoing, for instance many goods were still being rationed in the early 1950s. 60s	It is known as the Swinging Sixties and is associated with the birth of British pop music and fashion. In the 1960's, life started to become a little more 'adventurous'. The 1960's was the biggest climate of change, it was an era of protest and life was not as simple. 70s	The decade began with an equal pay act and, the assumption that women should receive some pay and benefits as men, if the work was similar. Unemployment was low therefore, the economy was good. People's lifestyle was starting to have choice. Affordable foreign holidays were very popular in the 1970's. For both men and women, life was not revolved around married life and children.	1970 population of Britain = 54 million	1971-Digital watch 1972-Email 1975-Digital camera 1979-Mobile phone 1979-Walkman	It was a decade of strikes - postal workers, miners, and dustmen. It ended with the 'winter of discontent' 1979- when ITV went off the air for five months 1972-. A three-day week was imposed during February to save on electricity at the start of the miners' strike. 197- the weather turned so dry that water supplies reached critical low levels. 1977-the whole nation celebrated the Queen's Silver Jubilee with street parties.
80s	In the 1980's Margaret Thatcher had just won the general election, which made her the first woman to become Prime Minister. This was a huge change for women, as they felt more empowered. Although this was a great time for change, the 1980's also saw Argentina invade the Falklands; Britain went to war. 90s	In the 1990's marriage rates had fallen whilst, divorce had risen. 1990's was a decade that saw rapid change, popular culture was becoming increasingly popular along with new gadgets for adults and children. Life seemed to sway away from the 'traditional' family life and this was becoming normal. 00s	Everyday life in the 20th century has seen huge changes. By the end of the century humans had been into space, transplanted organs and invented the Internet, but there were still huge inequalities. Family life in the 2000's had completely changed. It was stated that nearly half (46%) of lone parents were not in employment.
